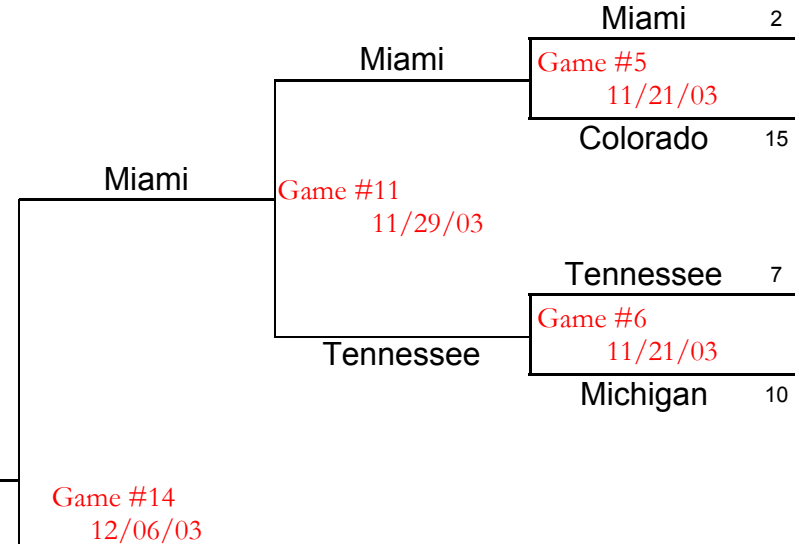
1. 2003 season limited to 11 games in 12 weeks from 8/23/03 to 11/08/04. Bowl games remain important and rotate annually.

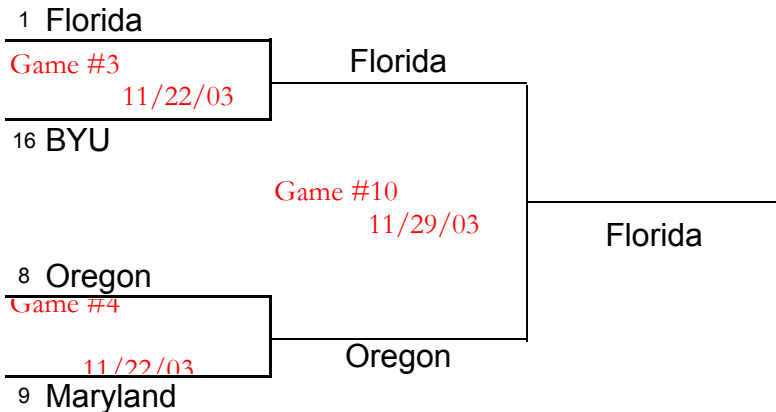

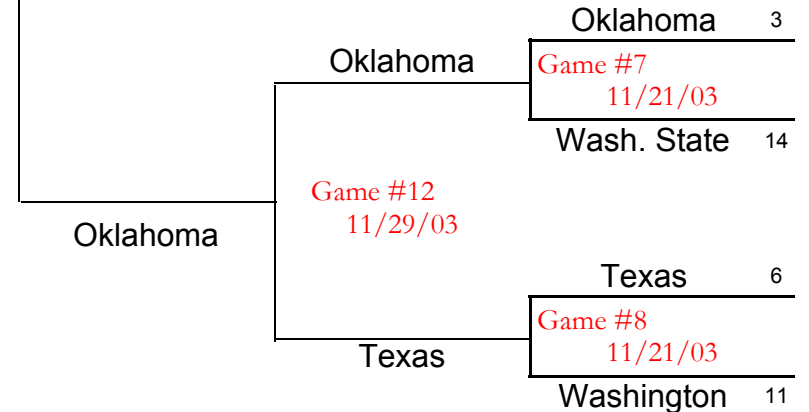

**Footnotes:**

1. Tournament pairings based on BCS standings as of November 19, 2001. Example assumes victories by the higher seed in every meeting. However, tournament format allows the "other bowls" to attract the higher echelon competition in the event of first round upsets. Who wouldn't want to see 1st round match-ups like Tennessee vs. Michigan and Georgia vs. Nebraska?
